Recognizing True Spiritual Leadership

1 Timothy 3:1-7, Titus 1:5-11

1. Does he desire to be a leader? 1 Timothy 3:1

To desire this office is not to desire honor, it is to desire work God needs men who are willing to lead

2. How long has he been a Christian? 1 Timothy 3:6-7

Physical age is important but more so is spiritual maturity He must have been a Christians long enough to be proven as: Blameless, good to those outside the church

3. What kind of marriage does he have? 1 Timothy 3:2

Literal translation is "one woman man" What better example is needed in the church today?

4. Do his children respond to his leadership? 1 Timothy 3:4-5

Notice the word "manage" He must be able to encourage, love and discipline

5. What kind of inner character does he possess? 1 Tim 3:2

He must be temperate, not impulsive, 1 Tim. 3:2 He must be prudent (sober)-exercising good judgment

6. How does he react to circumstances? 1 Timothy 3:2

Does he exhibit good behavior even in harsh times? 1 Tim3:2 Could he handle the workload of overseeing the church?

7. How does he relate to others? 1 Timothy 3:2-3

Hospitable—is he open to people? (his home and his ear)
Apt to teach-does he know enough? Likely to teach others?
No striker? Does he lose self-control?
Gentle or patient—must he always have his way?
Not a brawler-Is he a fire fighter or a fire starter?

8. Does he have bad habits? 1 Timothy 3:3

Is he given to wine? 1 Timothy 3:3
Is he greedy for money? 1 Timothy 3:3
Is he covetous? For money, power or fame? 1 Timothy 3:3

9. Does he know and love the Word of God? Titus 1:9-11

Hold fast the faithful word Able to exhort with the word Able to contradict those who contradict the Word
